

## The PSACEA Project won Erasmus+ Jean Monnet Module Grant

The project European practices on Green Deal: lessons for Ukraine (EUGREEN), conceived and headed by the interdisciplinary team of two PSACEA departments – the Department of International Economics & Public Management and Administration and the Department of Ecology & Environmental Protection, – entered the list of winners of one of the most prestigious educational programmes in the European Union – the Erasmus+Jean Monnet Modules.

The project proposal was initiated and formulated by an interdisciplinary team of academics under the leadership of Prof. Yulia ORLOVSKA, the Head of the Department of International Economics & Public Management and Administration, and Prof. Tetyana YAKOVYSHINA, the Head of the Department of Ecology & Environmental Protection, with comprehensive organizational support from the Centre for International Education and Cooperation, headed by Assoc. Prof. Yuliya DEGTYARIOVA. Assoc. Prof. Veronika CHALA, the Department of International Economics & Public Management and Administration, and Kristina DRYGOLA, the Head of the PSACEA Council of Young Scientists participated actively in the preparation of the proposal.

Congratulations to the team on winning a grant from the European Union. The team of authors have received funding under the Jean Monnet Module Erasmus + program for 2022-2025 to develop and implement educational and research activities on *European practices on Green Deal: lessons for Ukraine* (101085133 — EUGREEN). The project received a high rating from the European Commission, scoring 90 points out of 100 possible (a total of 70 points was required to be eligible for the grant).

This project is designed to encourage students to acquire knowledge about the experience and best practices of green economy in the EU countries, as well as about the prospects of green, environmentally friendly development of the national economy in Ukraine. Attracting young and experienced specialists within the framework of this project will allow developing innovative methods in teaching and research on the European experience of green growth. Training in new educational disciplines, as well as round tables with representatives of business and local authorities, quests, conferences, and publications are planned. The main effects for participants are expected to be increased awareness of European studies, which will bring added value in their future careers, create prerequisites for the solidarity of society, and support young teachers in increasing their professional growth.
